


As an intentional therapeutic community established over 30 years ago, Ionia, Inc. (Ionia) has created a permanent home for Trust beneficiaries who experience mental illness, developmental disabilities, addiction, traumatic brain injury, and Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. Members of the Ionia community have engaged in numerous Trust-led initiatives, the Beneficiary Employment and Engagement initiative being one of the most prominent areas of contribution; however, the Trust and its beneficiaries have benefited greatly from the advocacy by Ionia community members. The Trust provided technical assistance and grant funding support to Ionia, which enabled them to contract professionals to establish a perpetual endowment invested through the Alaska Community Foundation, to establish a pathway of perpetual financial support for the Ionia community. This was a strategic step to move Ionia away from being dependent upon Trust grant funding and state grant funding, and to create a revenue stream for the future generations of the Ionia community. This funding request, which is a partial contribution to a larger Ionia match, will enable Ionia to once again work with a professional to create an impenetrable Liability Waiver. Trust beneficiaries experience multiple barriers to housing and, once they have met the criteria for chronically homeless, are unlikely to access services or be housed without significant outreach efforts. This project would give chronically homeless individuals in the Fairbanks area consistent opportunities to engage in both services and housing opportunities to end their chronic homeless status.

In order to overcome these barriers to housing, the Fairbanks Reentry Coalition will provide the identified population of beneficiaries with housing supports and peer support services to ensure returning beneficiaries participating in the program have safe and stable housing, which will aid their successful reentry into society.

Agnew Beck Consulting performed the pre-development work for GHC, which stated that the clinic needs to double or triple in square footage by 2024 to meet increasing regional care needs. Trust funds will support construction of a new clinic, which will be located in downtown Girdwood. GHC already has over \$5 million secured for this project. An interdisciplinary team of staff within the University of Alaska (UAA) College of Health, along with several peer support specialists from the community, have teamed up to develop several layers of training and supervisory support in the current behavioral health crisis system of care. Trust funds will be used in developing a simulation lab experience for peer support specialists and their colleagues who serve on crisis triage teams. This level of knowledge and training support does not currently exist in Alaska, so the simulation lab training would provide an important step towards increasing the competence of individuals seeking to provide these services. These funds will also be used in developing a supervisory module for staff who oversee peer support specialists. The UAA Center for Human Development will also expand their learning management system to assist community members in tracking their training hours and credits towards the peer support certification process with the Commission for Behavioral Health Certification. The Council of Athabascan Tribal Governments (CATG) is currently planning for construction of the clinic in Arctic Village to begin in 2021. CATG received a majority of the funding needed for the project in 2020 but, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, construction was delayed. However, design and permitting is complete. The Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium (ANTHC), Department of Environmental Health and Engineering (DEHE) will manage this project. Due to the remote location of Arctic Village, this clinic is the only local option for healthcare services and plays a critical role in providing residents with regular health and behavioral health care. The Arctic Village Clinic Replacement project will serve all categories of Trust beneficiaries at the clinic.
