


This event is geared to health professionals who see people with TBI and has a behavioral focus, so people can understand the behavioral symptoms that might manifest after experiencing a physical and/or emotional trauma and how some of these symptoms may look similar despite being due to different underlying causes. This event is open to anybody that wants to learn. Beneficiaries and caregivers attending may learn new things to help them coordinate their own care if they fall through the cracks in systems, and empower individuals to participate in their own care by becoming educated about options or treatment tracks they may not have previously considered.
