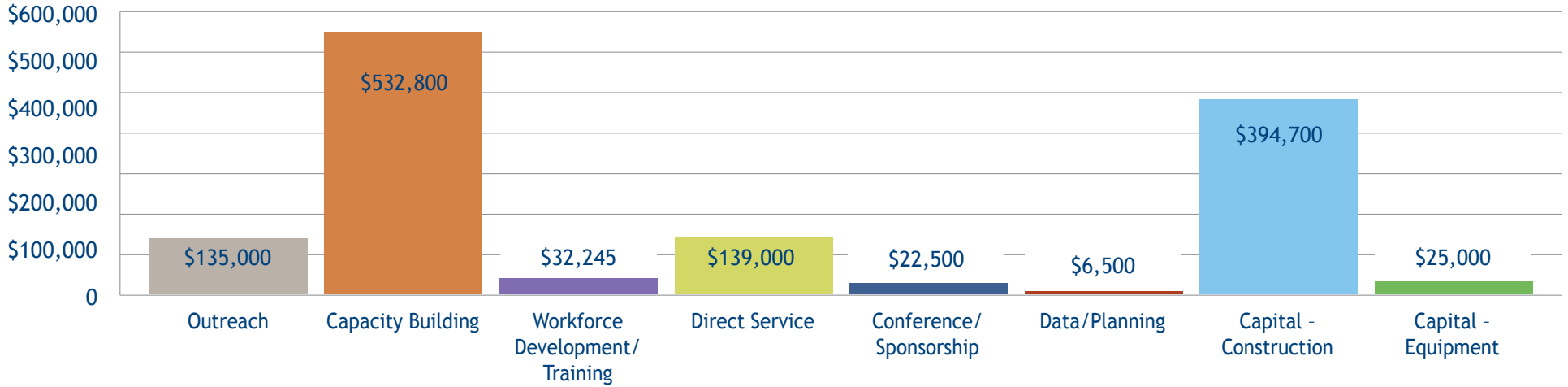
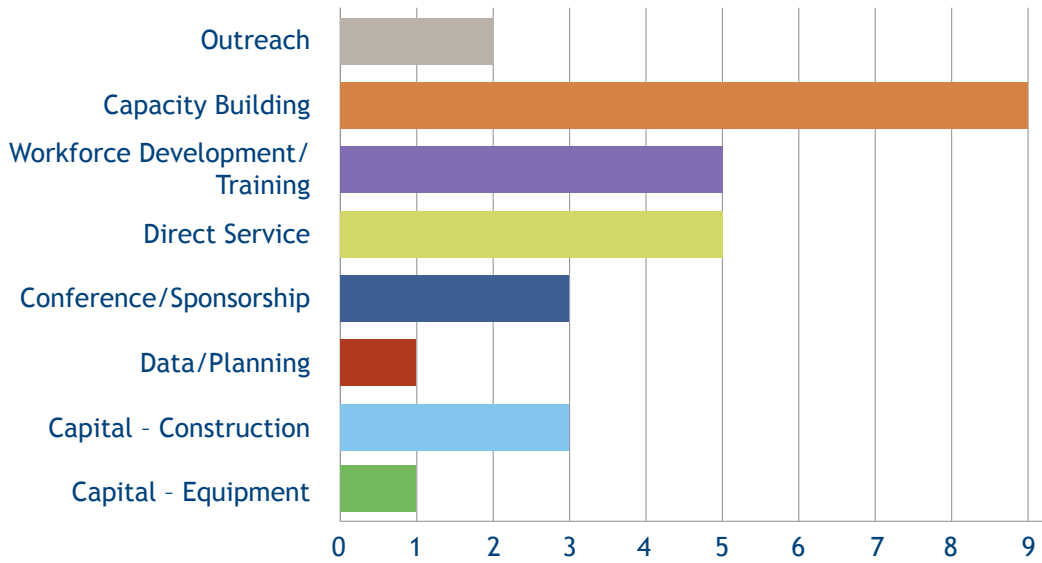

<p>The Fairbanks Reentry Coalition (FRC) envisions a community that is safer and stronger by being supportive of returning citizens and their process of rehabilitation. The coalition organizes community organizations to engage in collaborative services and relationships. The FRC's mission is to create a community where returning citizens have the support and services to successfully achieve their personal goals and to not recidivate.</p> <p>In 2019 FRC was awarded the State Opioid Response grant for peer support and with their many community partners have contracted with Peerstar, LLC to provide peer support, forensic peer support and peer support supervisor training. Peerstar provides specialized forensic peer support services in prisons and in the community to individuals involved with the criminal justice system who are suffering from mental illnesses and/or substance use disorders. Peerstar is a national leader in providing forensic peer support services, and they are the first provider in Pennsylvania to use a research university-based program and curriculum. Peerstar works closely with law enforcement, corrections, probation and parole and the judiciary. Peerstar's forensic peer support program was developed in a unique partnership with the Yale University School of Medicine Program for Recovery and Community Health. The Peerstar program is based on the SAMSHA core competencies of Recovery-Oriented, Voluntary, Relationship-Focused and Trauma-Informed.</p> <p>The purpose of this training is to build a network of peer support and forensic peer support specialists as well as trainers and supervisors within the North Star Borough and statewide. Building this network will increase the FRC's capacity and ability to serve justice involved beneficiaries by providing them with a peer who has lived experience who can support and assist with facilitating seamless transition to services for opioid use disorder or at risk of opioid use disorder as well as mental illness outside of the correctional institutions. With the help of TGH staff, volunteers and social service providers, individuals experiencing homelessness and often not included in homelessness count were interviewed, their data entered into the Alaska Homelessness Management Information System. As a result of this effort, the community of Juneau was able to gain a clear picture of who is chronically homeless in Juneau as well as important demographic information. Providers were able to utilize this information while working on bringing services to chronically homeless individuals. The results were used in selecting individuals to move into the Juneau Housing First Collaborative. <p>The Girdwood Health Clinic Executive Director and Board of Directors have requested Trust funding to assist their board and the board of the Turnagain Arm Health Center (TAHC), which is the land owner upon which the existing Girdwood Health Clinic is currently located, to contract with pre-development specialists to help evaluate interim and long term space expansion options.</p> <p>The Girdwood Health Center will utilize Trust funds to procure contractor(s) that will address everything from space needs assessments, architectural and engineering work-ups along with cost assessments, longer term facility solutions - including merging joint board oversight of the clinic and future structures.</p> <p>The Girdwood Health Center is a Federally Qualified Health Center and provides integrated primary care services to residents in the service area which ranges from Indian to Hope, as well as from Anchorage and the Mat-Su Valley. Resolving the facility's current space needs will enable the clinic to expand available mental health and substance use disorder services, as well as add dental and pharmacy to the repertoire of available clinic services.</p> <p>GHCI estimates serving a total of 155 direct Trust beneficiaries in 2019 and an additional 1,250 secondary beneficiaries, which includes family members of Trust beneficiaries. Helping GHCI obtain the necessary capital-related technical assistance will help the organization not only address immediate space needs, but also obtain the proper information to establish a solid capital plan for future expansion and/or relocation in Girdwood. <p>IMPACT, delivered by the Alaska Literacy Program, is recommended to be funded in partnership with United Way. IMPACT Family Literacy serves low-income immigrant and refugee families with young children. Immigrant and refugee parents often come from violent upheaval and horrific experiences. They have experienced trauma and loss of their home country and life in the refugee camps. Their children have been born in camps knowing no home country. Immigrants and refugees suffer stresses involving the integration of new culture, learning a new language, loss of status, low income, low self-esteem, lack of social support and poor physical health. These circumstances lead to mental health problems including depression, anxiety disorders that impairs their ability to function and particularly post-traumatic stress disorder. Additionally, IMPACT is a program that provides screening and referrals for children with developmental disabilities.</p> <p>IMPACT addresses these problems by providing a safe and trauma informed program for parents and children. Parents receive support from fellow Anchorage community members who teach the adult literacy classes. Children attend the preschool to learn the skills and behaviors they need to succeed in school. Parents learn how to help their child succeed and grow in their new home. IMPACT is a partner in the Strengthening Families Initiative, building on the five Protective Factors in its programming. These factors include parental resilience, social connections, concrete support in times of need, knowledge of parenting and child development, as well as social and emotional consequence of children. One student that presents some challenging behavior will be the focus for the CBC behavior analyst's treatment plan and training protocols. This work will be done with staff from Sound Alternatives, the school district, parents and community volunteers. There will be a week of training on working with beneficiaries experiencing a high level of acute behavioral needs.
