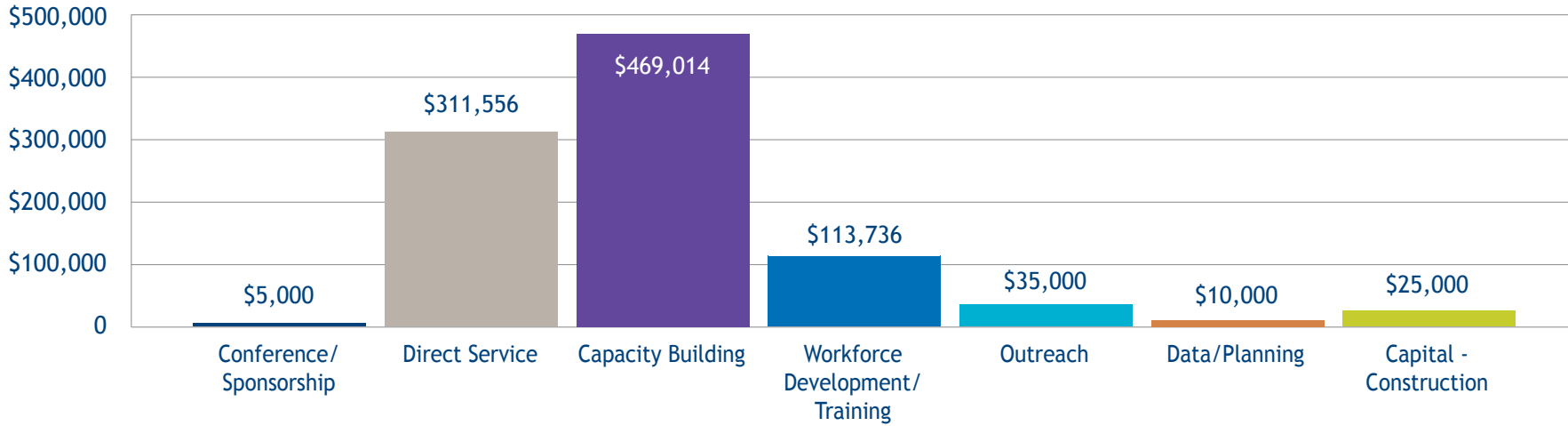
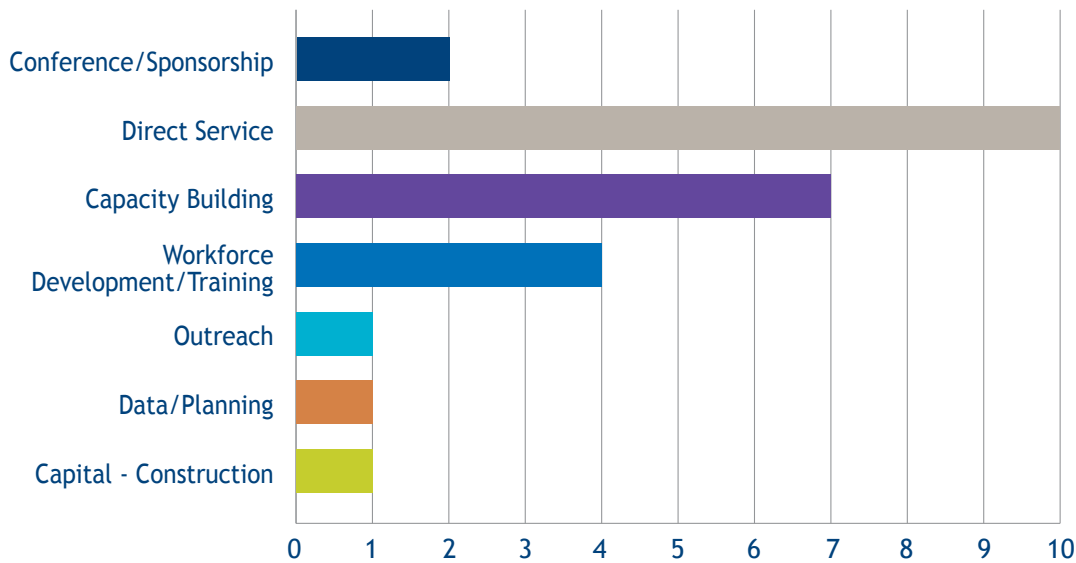

<p>A key strategy of the Trust's Disability Justice Effort is to support the training of law enforcement personnel on disorders experienced by Trust beneficiaries. Since 2001, the Trust has collaborated with local police departments to implement Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training, a national model that was developed by Major Sam Cochran of the Memphis Police Department. This national model provides law enforcement and first responders with the tools needed to properly interact with Trust beneficiaries in a productive and meaningful way and to reduce the need for the use of force when responding to individuals in mental health crisis. With support from the Trust, NAMI Fairbanks is working to bring CIT training back to the Interior and is requesting travel funds for three team members to attend the CIT training being offered at the Mat-Su Health Foundation in October 2019. By attending this training these team members will be able to co-instruct the next CIT academy and become certified CIT instructors which will allow for local CIT academies and greater attendance by Interior Alaska first responders. The members of the team who will attend the training include the Fairbanks Police Department CIT Coordinator (police officer), a social worker from Fairbanks Memorial Hospital, and one investigator from Adult Protective Services. Following the Mat-Su training, NAMI Fairbanks will hold a CIT Academy in Fairbanks in December 2019 to train 30 individuals representing Fairbanks Police Department officers and dispatchers, DOC correctional officers and probation officers and first responders.</p>		N/A

The Infant &amp; Early Childhood Mental Health Institute and Adolescent &amp; Family Behavioral Health conferences offer professional development and continuing education for the public and private workforce supporting beneficiary families and children. Trust funds budgeted for Bring the Kids Home (BTKH) maintenance and monitoring of children’s mental health service delivery and systems development have been used to support these events in past years through an RSA to the Division of Behavioral Health (DBH). As part of Federal requirements, the Mat-Su Health Foundation conducts a community needs assessment for hospital every three years. Through previous initiatives, the work of the Mat-Su Health Foundation has identified significant beneficiary related issues in the region. As part of the typical community needs assessment process, attempts are made to capture all needs of the population residing in the area. Unfortunately, in the community health needs assessment process, beneficiaries or individuals experiencing behavioral health or beneficiary related issues, are often not sampled. This project will allow for targeted sampling of beneficiaries not typically included in a community needs assessment sample, as well as use innovative methods to access the information. Trust funds will support the second year of the pilot project, the Library Community Resource Navigation program. This project provides outreach, information and assistance services for library patrons, especially those experiencing vulnerabilities. Like most urban libraries, one of Anchorage Public Library's core constituencies includes customers experiencing complex vulnerabilities, including poverty, homelessness, mental and behavioral health challenges. A 2017 survey of 795 Loussac Library patrons found that 27% of Loussac Library patrons experience at least one of these conditions. The project has a high level of community support. In addition to the project hosts and funders, the program collaborates closely with the Municipal Mobile Intervention Team, Anchorage Coalition to End Homelessness, Supportive Services for Veteran Families (Catholic Social Services), SNAP Outreach, Cooperative Extension Service SNAP Education program, Cook Inlet Housing Authority, Recover Alaska, Alaska Mental Health Consumer Web, Covenant House Alaska and the Vet Center. This grant would help fund an assistant social worker to support the current program coordinator help beneficiaries access resources they qualify for in an environment they already feel comfortable in. The addition of this position will allow expansion to the Mountain View and Muldoon libraries. Bean's Cafe will be operating Emergency Shelter overflow from November 2019 through April 2020. As the need is great for more bed/shelter space during cold temperatures, Bean's Cafe is increasing emergency shelter capacity by 50% compared to the previous year. The Municipality of Anchorage is the primary funder of this project and allowed using a portion of the grant to purchase cots and storage bins. Even though that need has been met, there are still a number of additional items needed to accommodate the increase in beds and to automate the shelter check in process in order to improve the data tracked by the city and in the Homeless HMIS. Bean's Café has since a decrease in donated food. The addition of food will help to ensure that the additional people using the overflow shelter beds will be able to be served meals at Bean's Café so that no one is turned away. The amended request includes: technology hardware/ software (including identification cards printer/equipment, computers), food and supplies. This project is recommended for funding as it helps improve the capacity of the emergency shelter system to participate in HMIS and ensure enough shelter beds are available during the winter months. From employment counselors to mental health professionals to housing assistance programs, the goal is to ensure participants have all the tools necessary to rebuild what they have lost and move forward. Project Homeless Connect events are held in many towns and cities across Alaska and all occur on the same date in January. This date coincides with the annual HUD Point In Time count that attempts to count the number of homeless individuals and families in an area. Trust funds will support a continuation of the work done in the Kenai area to connect homeless people with housing, services and supports. <p>Trust funds will support Anchorage Project Access (APA) to increase access to health care for Trust beneficiaries experiencing mental illness, chronic health conditions and homelessness by providing comprehensive outreach services at agencies serving beneficiaries, by enrolling beneficiaries in health insurance plans, by facilitating access to primary care and by coordinating a network of volunteer specialty medical and dental providers to donate care. Trust beneficiaries continue to suffer with unmet health care needs and often seek treatment through hospital emergency departments which is not cost-effective, nor does it facilitate ongoing preventive health care.</p> <p>Trust beneficiaries experience extensive barriers to accessing health care and navigating complex systems of care resulting in untreated conditions and severely compromised health. APA's Eligibility Specialist will provide over 150 outreach sessions at agencies serving homeless beneficiaries to facilitate access to health care, increase understanding of health insurance and access primary care. Access to health care is essential for optimal health, wellness and independence. APA facilitates a health home for all patients receiving services as well as providing eligibility screening and enrollment for donated care, ACA health insurance, Medicaid and Medicare. Establishing a health home for Trust beneficiaries allows individuals to receive ongoing health care for chronic, often untreated conditions, resulting in improved health and a reduction in the utilization of emergency departments for primary care. <p>The Men's Winter Night Shelter (MWNS) in Sitka will provide a safe, inside sleeping option for the community's unsheltered men on particularly inclement nights between December 1 and April 30. The MWNS will open on evenings when the nighttime low temperatures are expected to dip below 40 degrees. Particularly wet and stormy nights will also signal the option for the men to sleep inside. Pairs of male community volunteers will be recruited, trained to staff the MWNS, and provide supervision/support for those men choosing to participate by sleeping indoors.</p> <p>The community has successfully implemented a shower and laundry program for the men identified to benefit from the overnight warming shelter. The overnight warming shelter would be an interim service until a more permanent housing solution can be implemented. There is a tiny home solution that is in progress that SHC is working to have in place by next winter. <p>Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) is a medical condition that has a high prevalence in Alaska, but is treated the least, due to the lack of medical expertise in our state. Currently, there are no board certified brain injury doctors in Alaska, and any consultation that is received is through telemedicine, ECHO clinics at CHD/UAA, or from traveling outside of Alaska for care. The TBI beneficiary group has some of the most complex care needs in Alaska, making this project critical for helping to bring TBI medical expertise to clinical professionals, family members and care givers.</p> <p>The Center for Human Development (CHD) is a super hub for sponsoring ECHO clinics, and the head injury ECHO will support medical providers in gaining skills and treatment strategies for improving the lives of people who have experienced a TBI. <p>The Alaska Health Education Center (AHEC) works with youth across Alaska to introduce them to careers in the healthcare industry. Part of that education includes teaching them about mental health, how it can impact a person, and what they can do to help themselves and others. The National Council has produced the Mental Health First Aid curriculum, which is now considered a best practice. The National Council has produced the next phase of this curriculum, which is focused on teens. Trust funds will support bringing this curriculum in a train-the-trainer model to Alaska. This will help equip young Alaskans (almost 90% come from rural villages) to know what mental health issues look like and what they can do to help. Many of these students are Trust beneficiaries, and for the those that enter the healthcare field, they will be working to help other beneficiaries.
