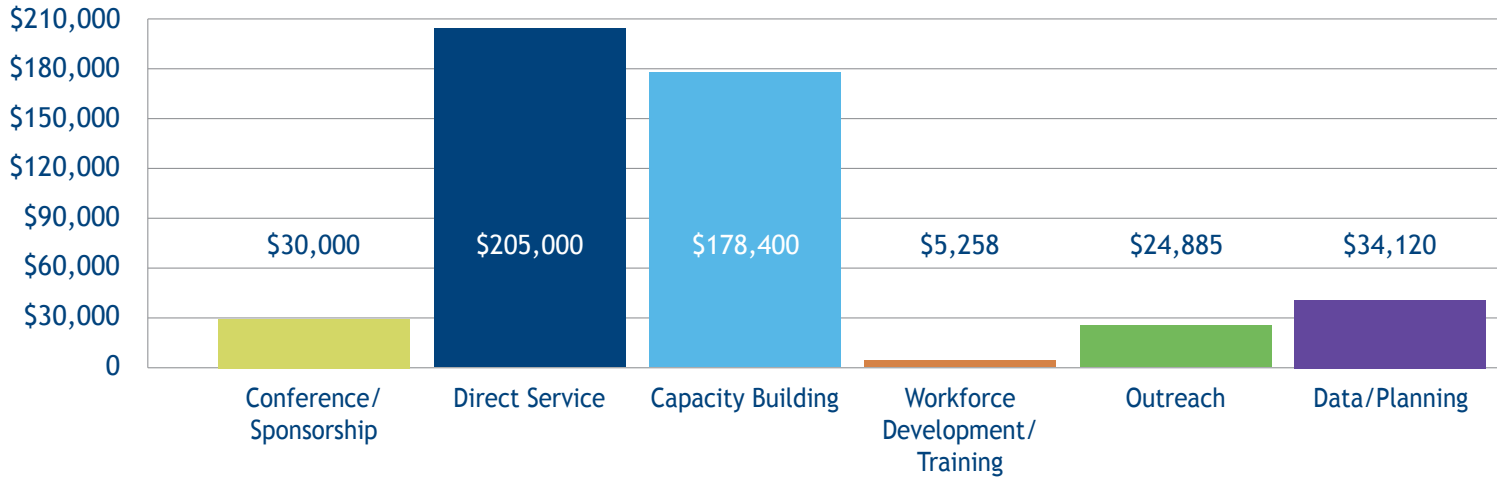
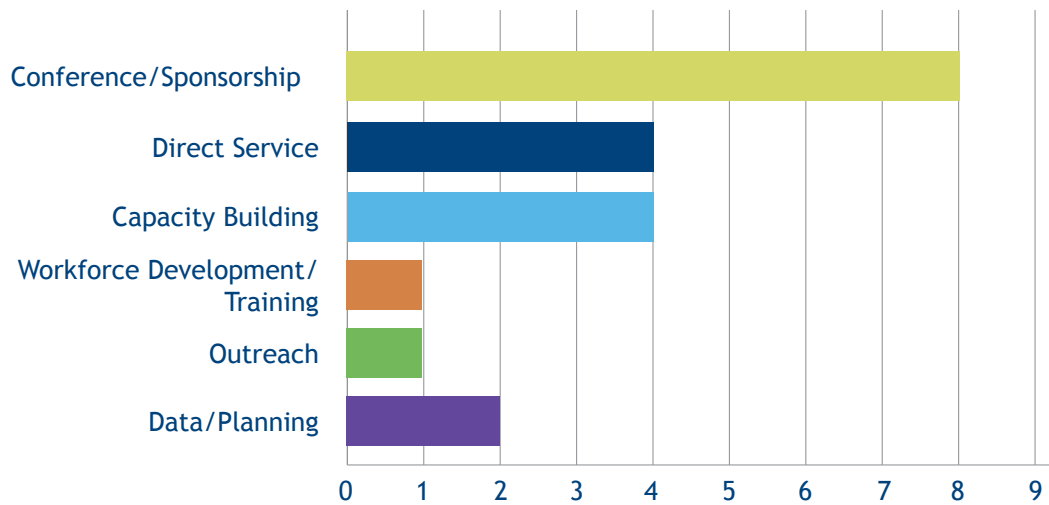

This project expands and extends Anchorage School District preschool mental health consultation pilot services originally funded in FY19. Early results from the pilot indicate a high level of satisfaction from pre-school educators supporting young beneficiaries in their classrooms - particularly those within special education pre-school classrooms. The addition of Northwood Elementary came from identification of the high level of beneficiary need in that school (five special education preschool classrooms) and will leverage additional community resources in the setting such as a mental health clinical intern. Supporting a second year of the pilot will allow the district and Trust to more effectively measure success of the services and identify barriers and best practices for sustainability and statewide replication. Funding will support travel for a seven member clinical leadership group comprised of both Southcentral Foundation and Providence to visit three identified programs which operate 23 hour crisis observation/stabilization and the sub-acute short term crisis residential programs. Two programs are located in Texas and the third in Idaho. SCF and Providence have been actively participating in the Trust's effort to generate interest in developing both levels of service to improve the psychiatric crisis continuum of care in Anchorage. The specific programs selected for a site visit were chosen with input from Trust staff to ensure the programs meet the core elements of programs operating within a Crisis Now Model framework, including the 23 hour observation/stabilization and short term crisis stabilization. At the conclusion of the visits, SCF will submit a summary which captures the analysis of the programs visited, how the models align with Crisis Now practices, and how the information gained during the program visits will inform operational and clinical program planning. Covenant House Alaska is the lead agency for the Anchorage Youth Homeless Development Program (YHDP). Anchorage submitted a successful application and has four active projects, placed in four different agencies that receive funding from HUD for this program. The Balance of State youth homelessness provider agencies are working together to submit an application to implement programs outside of Anchorage and are close to finishing up their year of planning. A summit between the Anchorage providers and Balance of State providers will be beneficial to both groups to share best practices, promising programs, and the Anchorage experience of applying for the YHDP grant. Topics to be discussed include the needs of specialty populations, employment for transition age youth, permanent supportive housing for youth, as well as general conversations about scalability and sustainability. While housing conferences have been held in the past, there has not been a specific focus on youth housing and homeless services. <p>The Interpretation Access in Mental Health Services for Forced Migrants project will make interpretation services available to mental health practitioners who are providing pro-bono services to Alaska Mental Health Trust beneficiaries in partnership with Catholic Social Services Refugee Assistance and Immigration Services (RAIS). RAIS provides forced migrants, such as refugees and asylees (people who have had to flee their countries of origin due to persecution), with the skills and services they need to transition to life in Alaska. RAIS serves approximately 575 individuals from 28 countries who speak approximately 16 different languages and live throughout the state. Many RAIS clients need mental health treatment for post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, anxiety, and adjustment-related disorders, among other issues. Due to lack of practitioners serving forced migrants in Alaska, often mental illnesses go untreated and can increase the risk of intensive care, institutionalization, and suicidality. This project will allow mental health practitioners that have completed the Working Alongside Refugees in Mental Health training to access telephonic interpretation services for forced migrants they are serving pro-bono.
