Project Description The Kenai Peninsula Homelessness Coalition operates the Nikiski Shelter of Hope (NSH), a 12-room, 22-bed facility that provides emergency and transitional shelter to families and individuals experiencing homelessness. The NSH currently limits use to 11-12 residents as required improvements are made. Trust funds will support this safety and upgrade project, which includes adding another layer of sheet rock throughout most of the building, upgrading the fire alarm system, and installing a fire suppression system. Architectural plans, electrical upgrades, and fire suppression system plans have been completed, and without these improvements, the shelter will not be able to remain open. The Kenai Peninsula Homelessness Coalition has raised most of the funding necessary to complete the work, and construction has started. Project Description Trust funds will support a Technology Upgrades project that will improve the computers and software used at the Native Village of Kotzebue (NVOK). The funds will purchase a software program for NVOK's social services programs, enrollment, and Tribal services to integrate all programs. This funding will improve the capacity of NVOK to serve Trust beneficiaries in the community. NVOK operates programs that enroll tribal members into the Division of Public Assistance benefits, intervene through the Indian Child Welfare Act with families that have a child identified as a Child In Need of Aid through the Office of Children's Services, offer Tribal enrollment, and provide social services and benefit programs that are funded by the Tribe. The primary focus of the social services programs will be on Tribal members who are experiencing chronic alcoholism or substance abuse as they face financial instability and are vulnerable adults without the means to be self-sustainable. There are typically no other funding sources to assist programs with equipment upgrades that offer a range of allowable purchases, including database upgrades or mobile technology for contemporaneous documentation. The Technology Upgrades project will serve as a critical resource to support organizational capacity and efficient business practices to serve beneficiaries better. NVOK had identified that all of the participants in their social services and child welfare programs are Trust beneficiaries, with the largest beneficiary groups being mental illness and addiction. Project Description Trust funds will support the AACcess to Communication project, will increase critical access to assistive technology (AT) devices for professionals who work with beneficiaries who experience complex communication needs. Devices for augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) offer people with speech and language limitations a way to express their thoughts, needs, and ideas. This project will increase the number of AAC devices available for demonstration or loan through ATLA for therapists and professionals to provide an evidence based AAC evaluation, offer an informed decision, and improve functional outcomes for beneficiaries who experience a barrier to communication. Beneficiaries will have opportunities to access assistive technology for improved communication. Removing communication barriers leads to improved health and well-being as well as better education outcomes. The system of care in Alaska has been reluctant to adopt assistive technology, and this project will provide individual evaluation of the devices to families so that money is not wasted on devices that do not fit the beneficiary's needs. Assistive technology gives beneficiaries the ability to remain in the home and community of their choice, with the potential to reduce the number of staff hours used to maintain independence.		N/A
