Attached for your information is a summary of Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority grants awarded in the fourth and final quarter of FY22. Between April 1 and June 30, 2022, the Trust designated \$2,310,752 in grants to organizations and partners that serve our beneficiaries. In FY22, the Trust has awarded \$3,745,999 in authority grants that are \$100,000 or smaller.




# Trust Authority Grant Summary, April - June 2022
