


The Anchorage Project Access (APA) program increases access to healthcare for Trust beneficiaries experiencing mental illness, chronic health conditions, and homelessness by providing comprehensive outreach services at agencies serving beneficiaries, by enrolling beneficiaries in health insurance plans, by facilitating access to primary care, and by coordinating a network of volunteer specialty medical and dental providers to donate care. Trust beneficiaries continue to suffer with unmet health care needs and often seek treatment through hospital emergency departments, which is not cost-effective nor does it facilitate ongoing preventive health care. Trust beneficiaries experience extensive barriers to accessing healthcare and navigating complex systems of care, resulting in untreated conditions and severely compromised health. Access to health care is essential for optimal health, wellness and independence. APA facilitates a health home (place to receive care) for all patients receiving services as well as providing eligibility screening and enrollment for donated care, ACA health insurance, Medicaid, and Medicare. Establishing a health home for Trust beneficiaries allows individuals to receive ongoing healthcare for chronic, often untreated conditions, resulting in improved health and a reduction in the utilization of emergency departments for primary care. This project benefits all beneficiary categories who need access to healthcare and are uninsured or underinsured.
