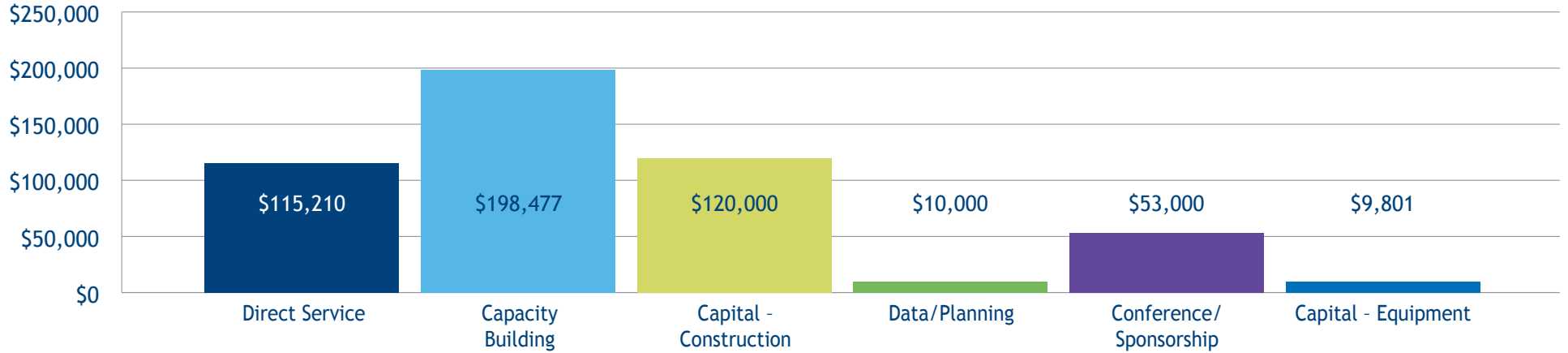
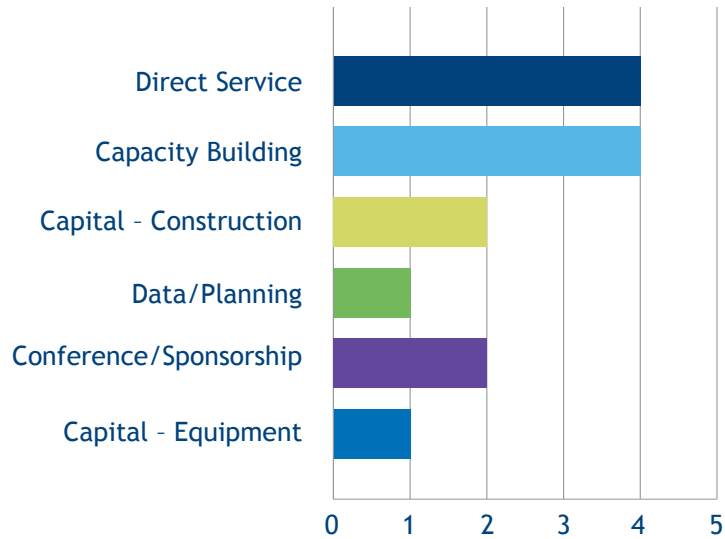

Trust funds will provide housing support for beneficiaries reentering society after incarceration who are confronted by barriers to housing due to their criminal history, mental illness, or other complicating factors. In Juneau, a number of returning beneficiaries have been trespassed, banned or are otherwise ineligible for shelter, and do not have a safe and stable place to live. In order to overcome these barriers to housing, the Juneau Reentry Coalition will provide the identified population of beneficiaries with housing support and peer support services to ensure those participating in the program have safe and stable housing, which will aid their successful reentry into society. The biennial Alaska Maternal Child Health & Immunization Conference is a collaboratively coordinated event that is co-lead by the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium (ANTHC) and the State of Alaska's Division of Public Health. The 2022 conference will be held virtually and will be easily accessible to a statewide audience of health professionals who serve beneficiary families and young children. Topics at this year's event highlight a number of important beneficiary issues, such as health and safety for beneficiary youth experiencing intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD), suicide prevention, prenatal drug and alcohol exposure, anti-stigma for families of children affected by Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD), and maternal depression screening. Kenai Peninsula Housing Initiatives, Inc. (KPHI) manages Tyee Court, an eight-unit apartment complex providing low-cost rental housing to Trust beneficiaries who have a mental health diagnosis. Originally, this supportive housing complex was intended to have 24/7 on-site staff, but changes in funding resulted in reduced on-site staff. Working with mental health providers and case managers, KPHI has identified ways to improve the security and well-being of beneficiary residents. The creation of a safe and secure outdoor area, combined with additional security cameras, will provide a better living environment for residents, as well as the ability to respond to tenant needs when there is no on-site staff. At each PHC event, a person experiencing homelessness can receive assistance from multiple service providers all under the same roof. From employment counselors to mental health professionals, and housing assistance programs, the goal is to ensure participants have all the tools necessary to rebuild what they have lost and move forward. PHC events are held in many towns and cities across Alaska, and all occur on the same date in January. This date coincides with the annual United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Point In Time count that attempts to count the number of homeless individuals and families in an area. The funding request from the Alaska Primary Care Association will support three Pre-Apprenticeship Training in Healthcare (PATH) academies for direct service providers (DSP). DSPs are the staff who deliver day-to-day services for Trust beneficiaries out in the community or in a residential setting. Therefore, they are considered the key staff for helping people with various disabilities gain an improved way of life. The PATH academies will provide a three-week intensive training opportunity that will equip people who may not have the education and/or training needed to enter the social service field. The academies provide the gateway for more individuals to become DSPs. This funding will provide the much-needed staff for Trust partner agencies who will then be able to provide more direct care to beneficiaries in need.		N/A

AWARE is a domestic violence women’s shelter in Juneau that provides a safe place to stay for women, with or without children, who are in violent relationships and are experiencing domestic violence and/or sexual abuse. Studies show that women who experience domestic violence and/or sexual abuse are three to seven times more likely to suffer from behavioral health issues, such as severe mental illness, post-traumatic stress disorder, or substance use disorder, than other women. These illnesses and disorders make them more susceptible to abuse by intimate partners or family members. In November 2020, AWARE finalized the purchase of a 3,200 square-foot building, and Trust funds are helping with the development of seven Single Resident Occupancy (SRO) units dedicated to survivors of domestic and sexual violence. These units will increase independence and safety for survivors in Juneau and from surrounding rural communities, and will represent a path to independence for persons who experienced violence in their relationships and, as a result, face barriers to renting market-rate housing. Trust funds will support beneficiaries experiencing substance use disorders in the Juneau community through a harm reduction intervention approach. Syringe exchange programs are known to reduce spread of infectious disease, including HIV/HCV in high-risk beneficiary populations, and to reduce the risk of drug overdose. Additionally, the syringe exchange program at Four A's provides education and treatment referral, and support for beneficiaries when they express interest, reducing stigma and increasing engagement in services. Four A's is an established Trust partner with strong community partnerships in support of Trust beneficiaries. Trust funding will be blended with local foundation and federal funds to support increased demand in services seen by the agency in recent years. Trust funds will support two important and consecutively scheduled annual events in April 2022, related to children's mental health. The Infant & Early Childhood Mental Health Institute and the Adolescent & Family Behavioral Health conferences offer professional development and continuing education for the public and private workforce who support beneficiary families and children. The conferences help to maintain and strengthen in-state workforce capacity for supporting beneficiaries with mental health conditions and their families. Building up and maintaining this in-state capacity is critical to keeping kids from being sent out of state for specialized care, in addition to effectively supporting kids returning from out-of-state treatment. The conferences are the premier professional development opportunities in the state for the children's mental health workforce. Topics to be highlighted relate to systems reform efforts, including the Medicaid 1115 Behavioral Health Demonstration Waiver, and support multiple identified Comprehensive Integrated Mental Health Program Plan (Comp Plan) objectives related to early intervention and prevention, as well as the continuum of care for beneficiary children and families. The Angoon Teen Center Renovation Project is a part of a larger community project to renovate the Alaska Native Brotherhood and Alaska Native Sisterhood (ANB/ANS) Hall in Angoon. Creation of a Teen Center and renovation of the ANB/ANS Hall will increase the community of Angoon's capacity to offer an array of cultural activities and programs for youth and adults, as well as a place to come together for community celebrations and gatherings, Tlingit song and dance practices, traditional food preparation and preservation, and other youth and Elder gatherings. ANS will offer local youth and adults a safe and inviting place to go in a rural village that has very few other recreational and after-school options. As ample research shows, a strong sense of belonging comes from an emphasis on cultural ties and social relationships, as well as a sacred sense of connection to one's ancestry and Tribal history. Individuals who continue to return to the beliefs and activities that sustained their ancestors will be healthier and less likely to experience substance use, depression, suicide, and Elder mistreatment. <p>The Division of Public Health and early childhood mental health partners are requesting Trust support to convene a training of the Facilitated Attuned Interactions (FAN) model for home visitors, consistent with early childhood behavioral health workforce needs and community demand. Trust funds for this event will effectively match federal funding recently approved for this purpose, and support expansion of the evidence-based practice by increasing the number of qualified trainers in the state while concurrently training community-based practitioners and multidisciplinary teams. <p>Trust funds will support the Kenai Peninsula Family Caregiver Support Program (KPFCSPP), administered by the Soldotna Area Senior Citizens, Inc. The KPFCSPP Respite project will provide respite care for beneficiaries and family caregivers to help prevent anxiety, depression, and suicidal ideation. Respite, support groups, and check-in contact can help end prolonged isolation and reduces depression, anxiety, and substance abuse often experienced by seniors and their caregivers when isolated. The goals of the project are to improve quality of life, reduce crisis medical or mental health care, support continued and enhanced caregiving, and support the family caregiver. Consistent support of family caregivers, paired with in-home services, has been shown to delay and avoid higher levels of care.</p>		N/A

<p>The Alaska Therapeutic Court Alumni (AKTCA) is a nonprofit organization that provides support to graduates of the Anchorage therapeutic court and has been established as a successful peer support program in Anchorage. This program has proven to be paramount to the success of therapeutic court graduates. This success was recognized this year by the Alaska State Legislature when the Legislative Task Force recommended, and the Legislature approved, funding for the permanent position of statewide Therapeutic Court Peer Support Coordinator (staffed by a Therapeutic Court Program graduate). Trust funds will support the newly created full-time coordinator position, as well as the expansion of a Peer Recovery Services program for participants and graduates in the Therapeutic Courts in Fairbanks, Juneau, Palmer, Kenai, Bethel, and Sitka.
