

The Resource Center for Parents and Children (RCPC) is a nonprofit aimed at supporting children and families to improve wellness and in the prevention and postvention of child maltreatment through various modalities, including parenting classes and supports, behavioral health services, and managing the Fairbanks Child Advocacy Center (CAC), Stevie's Place. RCPC currently serves children and families in Interior Alaska and the North Slope borough. Clinicians at RCPC are trained in evidence-based trauma treatment modalities to work with children and families, and RCPC partners with numerous community agencies to provide referrals and support. Trust funds will support the telehealth expansion project that directly supports children and families who have mental health concerns related to childhood trauma. This project would expand behavioral health services to include telehealth for clients residing in more rural and remote communities in their service areas through partially funding a clinician and clinical supervision as well as supplies and equipment to deliver telehealth services. Providing RCPC with funding for tele-behavioral health services would allow for continuity of services to reduce the impacts of childhood maltreatment and poor health outcomes associated with trauma and connect beneficiaries with referrals to local and statewide resources and linkages for medical and behavioral health supports. The pilot project benefits are numerous and far-reaching, including increasing accessibility to behavioral health treatment and support services for beneficiaries living in remote areas with limited resources or limited mobility. RCPC will utilize Trust Partnership funding as a demonstration for the expansion of behavioral health services and the need in the Interior and the North Slope. Project Description True North Recovery (TNR) Inc. is a Joint Commission accredited, comprehensive substance use disorder (SUD) and behavioral health provider serving the Mat-Su Valley and Fairbanks regions. TNR will use Trust funding for operations of the existing Mat-Su mobile crisis team (MCT), with this grant also supporting a new, second full-time MCT in the Mat-Su, allowing for program expansion into Palmer and surrounding communities. Following best practices, the MCT consists of a behavioral health clinician and a certified peer support specialist operating 24/7 to respond to and stabilize individuals in a behavioral health crisis in the community. Since its launch in March 2023, the Mat-Su MCT has responded to 163 calls, of which 132 were unique contacts, with 100% of the calls responding to Trust beneficiaries. TNR MCT's engagement with Trust beneficiaries through their response has fostered connections to additional levels of care, and diverted Trust beneficiaries from the hospital emergency rooms and the criminal justice system. TNR is uniquely poised to continue operating the MCTs, as they currently operate several services within the Day One Center, an innovative behavioral health approach to meeting the needs of Trust beneficiaries seeking and needing support. The service array consists of comprehensive same-day integrated assessments, psychiatric medication management, withdrawal management, outpatient services, and peer support and recovery services. TNR has developed strong community partnerships in the full continuum of care by partnering with the Wasilla Police Department and Mat-Com Dispatch, as well as strong referral connections with the Mat-Su Community Care Team, formerly known as the Post-Crisis Network (PCN). Community members and providers in the region have expressed strong support for the TNR MCT, and a willingness to expand the current service area beyond Wasilla. MCTs are one of the key elements in the Crisis Now framework that is transforming how Alaskan communities respond to individuals in a mental health emergency.

WAVE provides the following services: support groups, legal advocacy, court accompaniment, safety planning, screening, and referral. WAVE's clients are 100% Trust beneficiaries. This is a one-time capital request, which will allow WAVE staff and volunteers to provide a safe and stable environment for the beneficiaries receiving care.
