

Project DescriptionAlaska Behavioral Health (AKBH) will use Trust funds for the continuing operations of the 24/7 mobile crisis team (MCT) based in the Fairbanks region. Mobile crisis response is a key component of the Trust and partners' initiative to improve behavioral health crisis response across Alaska using the nationally recognized Crisis Now model as a framework. This is the fourth year of operational funding for Fairbanks MCTs, and AKBH will continue to build on the relationships with the Alaska State troopers as MCT response expands outside of the Fairbanks area to include the jurisdiction of North Pole. In the last year, the Fairbanks MCT responded to 744 Trust beneficiaries out in the community and successfully stabilized 85% of them, which lowers the utilization of the emergency room and jail in the continuum of care. STAR and the Alaska AIDS Assistance Association, aka Four As, are the co-owners of UNP. UNP does have a reserve account that is maintained from monthly lease fees from the tenants, however, that has been utilized recently for roof repairs.
