


Trust funds will support the building of Phase II of the Alaska Friendship Circle Play Center on the Alaska Jewish Campus. This will be an indoor play space for children with intellectual and developmental disabilities or delays, and/or behavioral health challenges. Once built, this center will provide an inclusive and accessible play environment for children 15 months to 9 years old with disabilities and/or behavioral health challenges as well as a place of connection, support, and resources for families. This Trust grant is for capital costs for the adaptive indoor play equipment designed to meet the needs of children with physical, developmental, and sensory disabilities. This specialized equipment—such as sensory panels, a music station, balance stations, wheelchair-accessible tables, and transfer-friendly climbers, ensures that all children can safely engage in active, meaningful play. Trust funds will support the All Alaska Pediatric Partnership (A2P2) in implementing Help Me Grow Alaska (HMG-AK) to connect families to care navigation, developmental and social-emotional screening and timely referrals to community providers through their Centralized Access Point. HMG-AK continues to experience significant statewide growth, with more families seeking support for behavioral and mental health needs. The program enhances early identification and coordinated access to developmental, behavioral, and mental health services for Alaska families, particularly for Alaska Mental Health Trust beneficiaries experiencing developmental disabilities, mental illness, or cognitive impairments. The HMG-AK model bridges service gaps and reduces isolation for families who face barriers to care, ensuring equitable connection to supports regardless of geography or circumstance. Serving families prenatally through age 26, with a focus on children birth through age eight, HMG AK promotes early intervention as a critical protective factor, reducing long-term health and social costs while building stronger foundations for lifelong wellness and stability among Alaska’s Trust beneficiaries and their caregivers. Trust funds will support multiple small projects administered by Alzheimer’s Resource of Alaska including: the Forget Me Not Chorus, ArtLinks, caregiver guides, technology improvements, and pre-development remodel planning. Alaska’s aging population is growing and, with it, the number of people with ADRD is growing. Service demand is high without the service infrastructure in place to support people with ADRD and their caregivers. ARA is one of the few organizations in Alaska dedicated to serving Trust beneficiaries with ADRD and need additional investment in some of their small projects to keep up with demand. The Forget me Not Chorus and ArtLinks programs connect beneficiaries with creative pursuits to keep them active and engaged with the community. Caregivers will receive support through miniguide references. The evidence-based SAIL and BRITE programs, directly serve individuals experiencing Alzheimer’s disease, Parkinson’s disease, mild cognitive decline, traumatic brain injury (TBI), and related conditions. These individuals are the primary beneficiaries of this project, as the program is specifically designed to address their unique physical and cognitive challenges. Regular exercise and improving balance has been shown to reduce falls which are the leading cause of brain injury in older adults, and these fitness programs are designed to improve both body and mind to prevent or delay cognitive decline. Trust funds will pay for behavioral health services to be co-located at the Covenant House Alaska campus. Covenant House Alaska (CHA) serves homeless youth in the Anchorage area ages 13-24. Youth experiencing homelessness, exploitation and human trafficking will have access to mental health and substance use disorder services on campus, eliminating a barrier to services dramatically increasing the likelihood that youth will follow through with assessment and treatment compared to an off-campus program. In the most recent full analysis of youth accessing services at the Youth Engagement Center, 65% had a mental illness, 33% had a developmental disability, 58% struggled with alcoholism or substance use, and 10% had experienced a traumatic brain injury. This project primarily focuses on beneficiary youth with mental health and substance use disorders, while also providing preventative services to the broader population of homeless youth.		N/A

Trust funds will support replacement of the exterior siding on one of Hope Community Resources, Inc. assisted living homes in Kenai. The project will involve removing the current exterior siding and installing new PVC siding. The home was built in 1987 and no longer provides adequate weather protection or energy efficiency. Hope’s mission is to provide services and support that are requested and designed by individuals and families who experience disabilities, promoting choice, control, family preservation, and community inclusion. These homes offer living arrangements tailored to each person’s needs. This particular home currently supports two Trust beneficiaries. Trust funds will cover contracted personnel to increase targeted support for at risk students at the middle and high school, and a registered nurse from the Petersburg Medical Center to help identify concerns such as unsafe or unstable home environments, lack of basic resources, and physical symptoms related to emotional trauma, the SEL curriculum subscription, and supplies to support suicide prevention trainings. Trust funds will support one year of salary and associated costs for a full-time, certified school counselor serving K-12 students across four rural communities on the Kenai Peninsula: Tyonek, Nanwalek, Port Graham, and Ninilchik. The counselor will provide culturally responsive, school-based mental health services through a regular rotation scheduling. This project directly supports youth who are at risk of becoming Trust beneficiaries due to elevated rates of depression and suicidal ideation. The project increases access to consistent, school-based mental health care in very isolated communities, implements evidence-based prevention strategies shown to reduce suicide risk and strengthen protective factors, improves early identification and intervention for at-risk youth, strengthens school completion, connectedness to caring adults, and family community support systems. This is the fifth and final year of implementing the pilot project: TABI Phasic Implementation Plan for Identification, Intervention, and Continued Assessment of Capacity and Community Infrastructure Building (the project), which will create and implement processes for early identification and intervention services for TABI that require system-level changes. The intent of this effort is to ensure that individuals with TABIs are identified and provided supportive services at the earliest point in time possible to maximize their quality of life; the long-term goal is to ensure people served by SCF are routinely screened for TABI and, when indicated, assessed, diagnosed, and referred to services as quickly as possible. Trust funding will support an environmental modifications pilot project implemented by Southeast Alaska Independent Living (SAIL) to improve the delivery of Medicaid environmental modification services. SAIL is an independent living center based in Southeast Alaska, they have worked with home modification programs for decades and have detailed experience working with the Medicaid home modification program. The environmental modification service offered through the 1915c HCBS Medicaid waivers is in significant need of reform. The administrative burden of the program has led to an almost nonexistent provider list of construction contractors willing to bill for waiver services, and because of the extra paperwork involved, care coordinators are more likely to go through grant programs for home modifications than process a request through the waiver services even when a client is eligible. This project will test a new way of administering the program to reduce bureaucracy and inform policies needed to have an effective Medicaid Home Modification program.
