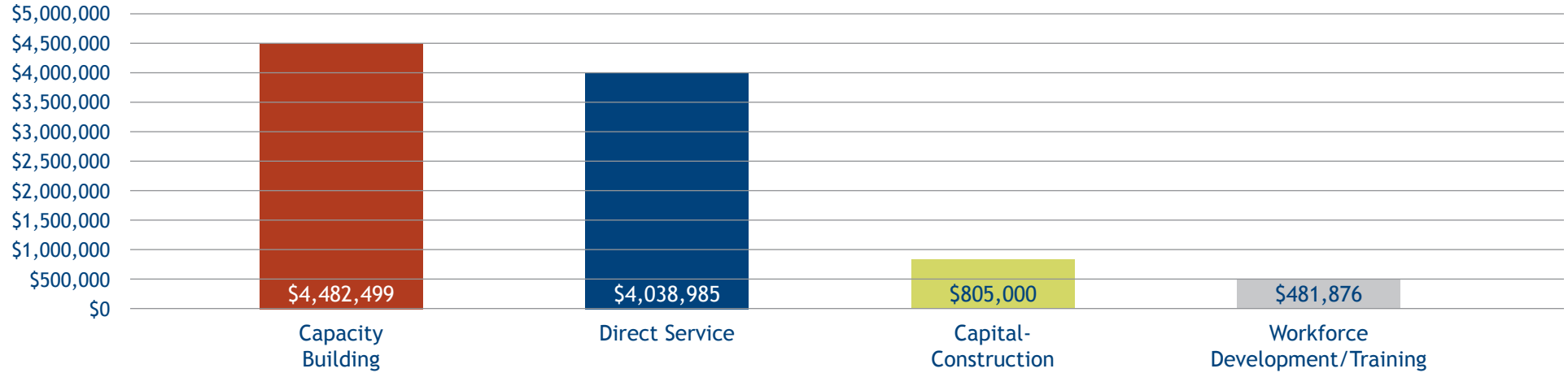
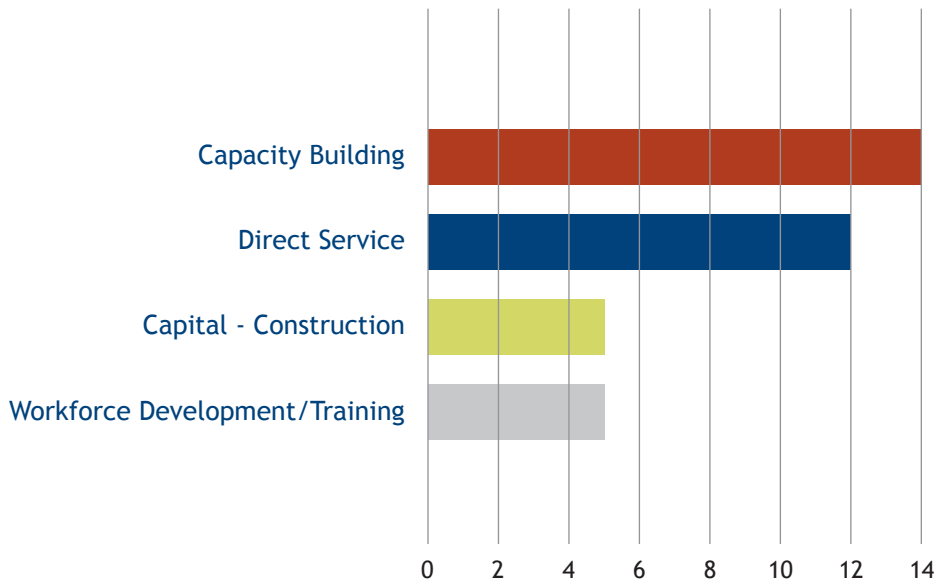

Funding will directly support a Volunteer Coordinator to recruit and manage volunteers and a part-time staff attorney to represent beneficiaries, statewide, in the full range of public benefit matters. Shéiyi Xaat Hit Youth Shelter and Transitional Living program provides four emergency shelter beds for youth 10-17, two transitional living beds for youth 16-17, and four transitional living beds for youth 18-21 in an attached apartment with a separate entrance. This project served 60 youth in 2025. All youth in the transitional living program (100%) and a large majority of shelter youth (83%) are Trust beneficiaries, most commonly those experiencing mental illness, trauma, or co-occurring disabilities including developmental disabilities, substance use disorder, and traumatic brain injury. Trust funds will support one-time capital improvements and equipment upgrades at The Open Door, a low barrier community support center, managed by the Council of Athabascan Tribal Governments (CATG) in Fort Yukon, Alaska. Improvements include remodeling portions of the shower area, replacing aging appliances, purchasing commercial laundry equipment, upgrading kitchen facilities, and adding furniture and program supplies to enhance the safety, function, and comfort of the space. Many individuals who access Open Doors are actively engaged in or transitioning into CATG behavioral health services through the Yukon Flats Behavioral Health Center. Others are in early recovery, experiencing housing instability, or seeking a safe and supportive environment to meet basic needs while working toward improved mental health and stability. Trust funding expands Covenant House Alaska's (CHA) homelessness-prevention model for youth exiting foster care into a statewide initiative. This expansion follows a successful demonstration project in which all participating youth remained stably housed. The project provides intensive navigation, early intervention, and flexible financial assistance to stabilize housing, prevent crises, and ensure youth transitioning out of foster care do not enter homelessness. Trust investment will allow CHA to reach 120 additional young people over two years—coordinating support before system discharge, strengthening connections to services, and addressing urgent financial barriers that place youth at risk of eviction, unsafe living situations, or system involvement. Approximately 100 youth age out of foster care in Alaska annually, often with few supports. The National Youth in Transition Database shows that 55 percent of foster youth in Alaska report experiencing homelessness by age 21. These investments ensure SDS can conduct comprehensive, standardized assessments for all recipients of the four 1915(c) waivers, Community First Choice (CFC), and Personal Care Services, as required for full implementation of the interRAI suite. FHS is the sole provider of urgent, emergent, and primary medical care for Unalaska and the surrounding Aleutian Island communities, including a large transient population connected to the commercial fishing industry. Because of Unalaska’s geographic isolation, frequent severe weather, and distance from off-island behavioral health facilities, IFHS serves as the primary point of contact for individuals experiencing behavioral health crises who require both medical stabilization and behavioral health assessment. This grant will help IFHS complete the construction and safety enhancements necessary for the behavioral health Safe Room. These improvements are essential for a trauma-informed, secure environment that supports short-term behavioral health assessment, stabilization, and monitoring while individuals await transfer, tele-behavioral health, or safe discharge. My House will use Trust grant funds to expand their operational clinical, behavioral health, and recovery services team by expanding clinical oversight, improving treatment availability, and reinforcing coordinated care across the continuum of services. My House is a nonprofit youth-serving organization in the Mat-Su that provides crisis stabilization, transitional housing, behavioral health treatment, vocational training, and case management. The organization operates a drop-in center as well as residential and outpatient clinical program.
